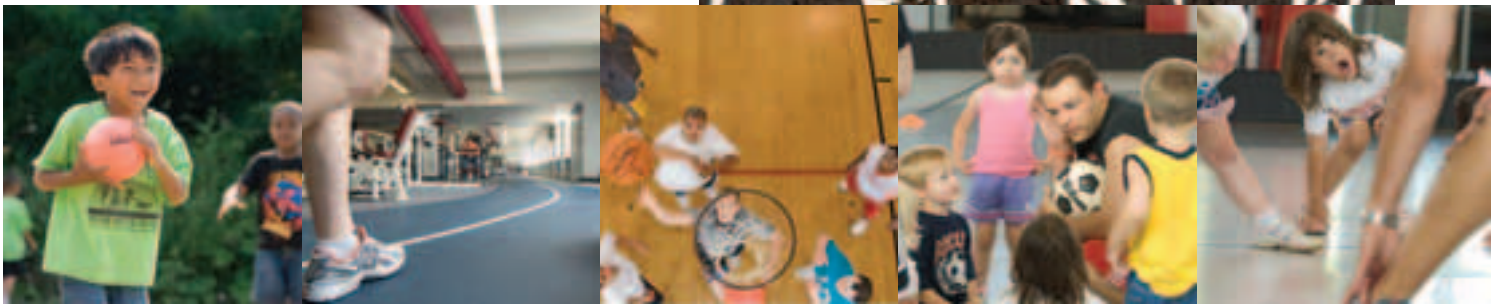

## LETTER TO THE **COMMUNITY**

It's not overstatement to say that 2007 was quite a year for the YMCA of Greater Cleveland.

For the first time in more than a decade, our Cleveland Association ended the fiscal year in the black. Financially, our organization has definitely turned a corner, and, while this is indeed a significant accomplishment, we still have a great deal of work to do in this area.

We will continue to focus on maintaining the financial stability of the Greater Cleveland organization. That work affects everyone and is critical to our future success. But the progress already made has been amazing.

We're extremely proud of the fact that we continue to strengthen the programs and services that we offer to our members, while at the same time remaining competitive in the Cleveland marketplace without adversely affecting services provided.

As we have said repeatedly, our philosophy is not, "business as usual." The YMCA of Greater Cleveland today is not the same YMCA that it was four years ago. We are a different organization on many levels. And that is why we've chosen "Branching Out" as the theme for our 2007 Annual Report.

The YMCA of Greater Cleveland still remains in many ways, one of Greater Cleveland's best kept secrets. By that, we mean that many people still remain unaware of all the good things done by this organization, as the premier health and social services agency that the Y is.

We are definitely "branching out."

2007 saw our continued expansion into Lorain County. Work continues toward the groundbreaking and late 2009 opening of a new French Creek YMCA at Avon, after voters in that community last November approved a quarter-percent income tax increase, which will provide \$8 million of the needed funding to construct the facility.

We continue to have conversations in Cleveland and other communities regarding collaborative partnering. 2007 was, in that regard, a year of great impetus for the future.

In September and October 2007, we hosted two major national conferences, bringing an estimated 1,000 people to Greater Cleveland, and pumping more than a quarter million dollars into the local economy.


The annual Strong Kids Campaign raised over \$540,000 in 2007, dollars which provide scholarship and program support.

The YMCA of Greater Cleveland was selected to receive a five-year \$2 million Racial and Ethnic Approaches to Community Health (REACH) grant from the Center for Disease Control and Prevention. This significant grant will enable us to work in partnership with the Cleveland Division of Recreation and numerous other community partners to eliminate diabetes and cardiovascular disease disparities among African Americans and Latinos in Cleveland, while at the same time promoting diabetes and cardiovascular disease education, screening and preventive programming.

2007 also saw a renewal of interest in our International Programs, after a summer visit by the Secretario General of YMCA España in Madrid, Spain.

We continue to focus on thinking locally and regionally when setting priorities, raising funds and allocating resources. And we continue to strengthen our corporate and branch community boards to ensure continued diversity and position our organization to raise significantly more contributions to sustain our operations. In the coming year, we will also be focusing on our facilities and the need to improve them for our members. Most are more than 50 years old, and in need of upgrading in order for us to remain competitive and provide the best level of customer service possible to our members.

## 2007 HIGHLIGHTS

### Strong Kids

- ▶ We served 1,400 youth in safe and enriching school-age child care programs at 15 locations throughout Greater Cleveland and surrounding communities.
- ▶ We served 349 children in high quality early childhood programs, allowing their parents to have peace of mind while they work or go to school.
- ▶ Our summer camp programs provided values-based activities to 1,026 youth at 12 sites throughout the community.
- ▶ The Lakewood YMCA Child Care Enrichment Center renewed their “Star One” quality rating in the state-wide Step Up To Quality initiative, a voluntary quality rating system designed to recognize centers that exceed minimum licensing standards.

- ▶ Through the generous support of the Thomas H. White Foundation, child care staff acquired 145 child development certifications through the “Building Strong Kids” Training Initiative.
- ▶ Over 325 children enrolled in YMCA early childhood and school-age child care programs received some form of financial subsidy for fees.
- ▶ In August 2007, the Cleveland State University Child Development Center, managed by the YMCA of Greater Cleveland, opened its doors to CSU students, faculty and staff in need of quality child care services. This milestone marked the first venture in infant and toddler child care for the YMCA of Greater Cleveland.
- ▶ The Euclid Collaborative hosted monthly support groups for Foster Parents and one for parents who have a child or children with a mental health diagnosis. They receive ongoing training and parenting classes through these programs.
- ▶ The Euclid Collaborative received funding to provide Out of School Time programs for children whose families fall 200 percent below the poverty level.
- ▶ The YMCA Splash program, a free basic water safety course for kids ages 6-12, served 192 youth. The program teaches youngsters with little or no swimming background the skills needed to stay safe in summer months. Activities include basic swimming skills, boating safety and activities to promote the YMCA core values of caring, honesty, respect and responsibility.
- ▶ The Ridgewood YMCA sent 11 of its top swimmers to compete at the YMCA Long Course National Swimming Championships at the University of Maryland, July 30-August 4. Participating swimmers were Katey Brooks, Brittany Krauth, Stephanie Andrask, Amanda Lancki, Alyssa Kmet, Annette Frac, Brad Bielak, Kevin Lancki, Phil Symons, Mike Demitrieff, and Jeff McManis. Out of the almost 2,000 YMCAs with competitive swim programs in the U.S., only 147 YMCAs had swimmers fast enough to be able to compete at this year’s national meet, which featured just over 1,300 of America’s top YMCA swimmers. The Ridgewood Y Dolphins Boys Team scored 74 points and finished in 24th place in the United States. The boys themselves finished 16th of all boys teams in the nation. The Ridgewood YMCA was the fourth best team in the State of Ohio, and the number one team north of Columbus. The 2,007 National Champions were from Middle Tyger YMCA located in North Carolina.
- ▶ Community Youth Development is the outreach branch of the YMCA of Greater Cleveland. It provides programs to youth and teens that focus on leadership, education and social development. In 2007 the CYD Branch of the YMCA served 2,589 teens and their families through a variety of programs and activities, a 52 percent increase over 2006.
- ▶ The 2007 Back-to-School Family Rally hosted on August 11, 2007 at Cuyahoga Community College’s Metropolitan Campus, drew more than 2,000 people. Eighteen hundred bags of school supplies were distributed to youth in need. Families enjoyed a day of educational seminars, entertainment, health screenings, family activities and more. Sponsors of this event included Cuyahoga Community College, the Eaton Corporation, the Cleveland Cavaliers, WellCare, NEON and Radio One. The event was organized with the help of many volunteers and community agencies committed to education.

► The Black/Hispanic Achievers Program is a college preparatory program for students in grades 8-12. The program provides educational support, leadership development and career exploration opportunities to students. In 2007, 73 teens participated in educational, career and social activities provided through this program. A highlight of 2007 included Black Achiever alum, Raquel Armstrong, a student at Wellesley College, who delivered the keynote address at the 2nd Annual Black/Hispanic Achievers Recognition and Scholarship Luncheon to 200 guests and friends of the YMCA of Greater Cleveland. The Hillcrest YMCA implemented a Black/Hispanic Achievers Program in 2007, serving an additional 25 youth.

► Through the Youth & Government Program, 12 teens visited Columbus to participate in the 2007 YMCA Regional Youth & Government Conference. Teens were able to present mock bills to more than 200 other teens interested in careers in government. The youth presented four bills with all four passing.

► Through a national grant of the YMCA of the USA, the YMCA CYD Branch was one of ten YMCAs across the country awarded \$18,500 from the Lumina Foundation to focus on educating students on the process of going to college. This grant allowed the YMCA of Greater Cleveland to hire three college interns from Cleveland State University to research and develop a program to deliver to high school students called “Know How 2 Go,” to prepare students for success in high school and getting into college. The program targets prospective first generation college students and low-income students and offers support to help them obtain a college education. In 2007 the college interns conducted more than 25 seminars to approximately 200 high school students from local high schools and YMCA Programs delivering the message “Knowing How 2 Go.”

► Positive Attitudes Change Everything holds true for the YMCA P.A.C.E. Tumbling program, for kids ages 5-16. The program builds positive character values in youth through acrobatics. Children participate in progressive program classes and have an opportunity to try out for the PACE Tumblers that perform around Cleveland for various events. In 2007, the program served 65 youth in instructional classes and the Tumbling Team performed at 18 events across Greater Cleveland. The program operates out of St. Paul’s Church on the west side and St. Joseph’s/Collinwood School on the east side. The program received a \$5,000 grant from Neighborhood Connections to support efforts in the Collinwood neighborhood.

► The YMCA Teen Court Program was awarded a \$22,562 contract from the Cuyahoga County Department of Justice Affairs to assist first time youth offenders within the juvenile justice system. The program offers youth charged with a misdemeanor offense a chance to clear their record and an opportunity to get involved in “positive” YMCA teen programs. The program operates out of the cities of Strongsville and Bedford Heights and served 58 referred youth utilizing the assistance of 27 teen volunteers that serve as attorneys, judges, juries, bailiffs and clerks to conduct the trials. The program offers a unique opportunity for youth to be held accountable by their peers and to engage in positive YMCA activities throughout the year that include community service projects, educational seminars, college preparation, career exposure and a variety of social activities.

► On January 15, the CYD branch held its third annual Martin Luther King, Jr. Day of Caring, “A Day On Not a Day Off” event with 32 youth participating in a day of community service. Activities included painting St. Joseph/Collinwood School gymnasium, singing at St. Vincent Charity Hospital and making Valentine Cards for a local women’s shelter.

► The LIFE (Living in Female Empowerment) program is a program for girls ages 9-12 and 13-18 that offers opportunities for them to interact with adult role models in order to increase their academic and social development. The program partnered with Success Tech Academy and the YMCA Summer Day Camp program to provide activities to 45 girls. The program received a \$5,000 grant from Neighborhood Connections.

► The YMCA is founded on the principals of volunteerism. The CYD branch of the YMCA utilized 65 adult volunteers to assist with programs and events throughout the year, totaling more than 5,000 service hours.

## Strong Families

- ▶ More than 145 families participated in the first “Give Thanks Dinner” and celebration at the Hillcrest Family YMCA in Lyndhurst. Also at Hillcrest, some 80 participants raised about \$8,000 in a branch golf tournament.
- ▶ The YMCA of Greater Cleveland, in partnership with the Silver Sneakers® Fitness program, served 2,500 senior citizens in health and wellness programs. Sponsored by Blue Cross and Blue Shield, the program helps seniors age happily and keep a positive outlook on life by promoting physical fitness, mental well-being and friendship.
- ▶ The Euclid Collaborative held a mini-RFP (Request for Proposal) process to give funding to some of our community partners to help fill gaps in service in the city of Euclid. The money was used to support three programs: a job training effort for adults, an academic enrichment program/college preparatory for teenagers at Euclid High School, and a support group/parenting program for teen mothers.
- ▶ 260 men were assisted with transitional housing services through Y-Haven.
- ▶ Project Green Team, an innovative job training program for Y-Haven residents, continued with support from the Key Foundation. The program served 37 individuals, and provides training and employment in the field of commercial cleaning. The goal of the program is to make Y-Haven residents self-sufficient. Eighty-eight percent of the individuals gained employment through the program.
- ▶ 250 people attended the annual Y-Haven benefit, “Steps & Stages,” on November 10 at Cleveland Public Theatre. Proceeds from the evening, which included the presentation of an original play and a silent auction, totaled \$43,000, which helped underwrite the Y-Haven program.
- ▶ More than 200 families at the Southeast Family YMCA in Bedford took part in programs such as Halloween at the Y, Breakfast with Santa or other family programs.
- ▶ The West Shore Family YMCA in Westlake began a west side traveling league series providing children and their families from West Shore, West Park and Lakewood the opportunity to play among and against others from the entire West Shore district.

- ▶ Special events at the Geauga Family YMCA brought more than 530 individuals to the branch including a New Year’s Day Open House, Active Older Adults Day, Healthy Kids Day and Halloween at the Y.

## Strong Communities

- ▶ The YMCA of Greater Cleveland was selected to receive a five-year, \$2 million Racial and Ethnic Approaches to Community Health (REACH) grant from the Center for Disease Control and Prevention to enable it to work in partnership with the Cleveland Division of Recreation and numerous other community partners to eliminate diabetes and cardiovascular disease disparities among African Americans and Latinos in Cleveland. The grant also enables the expansion of the Clevelanders in Motion staff to work in partnership with 12 Cleveland Recreation Centers to promote diabetes and cardiovascular disease education, screening and preventive programming.
- ▶ The YMCA of Greater Cleveland hosted the YMCA Strong Communities Conference, which brought more than 400 people to Greater Cleveland September 26-28. The conference was held at the Renaissance Hotel on Cleveland’s Public Square, with the theme of “Common Goals, Common Responsibility: How to Create A Sustainable Future.” Featured keynote speakers were Dr. Ian Smith, Angela Sarkis, Cheryle Jackson, Geoffrey Canada, Dr. Richard Carmona, and Dr. Jawanza Kunjufu.

► The YMCA of Greater Cleveland also hosted YMCA Program School October 18-24 at the Wyndham Hotel on Playhouse Square, which brought more than 400 YMCA professionals from across the country to Greater Cleveland. Both this event and the Strong Communities Conference pumped more than \$250,000 into the local economy, and focused the national spotlight on our city.

► The YMCA Professional Studies Program partnership between the Greater Cleveland YMCA, the YMCA of the USA and Cleveland State University's Maxine Goodman Levin College of Urban Affairs, has been renewed. The program helps YMCA professionals advance in their careers, and is community outreach related, as Cleveland State University Provost and Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs Mary Jane Saunders said. "We view this partnership as integral to the future success of our students, the greater community, and ultimately our future leaders in an ever-changing society replete with an abundance of new challenges."

► Voter approval of Avon Issue #35 on November 6, paved the way for the construction of a brand-new YMCA in that Lorain County community. The new YMCA facility will be located on a 122-acre site at State Route 611 and Interstate 90. The city of Avon will finance \$8 million of the \$13.6 million facility, with the YMCA of Greater Cleveland raising the remainder of the needed capital, including an additional \$450,000 for a planned Y-Express facility to serve the Lorain and Amherst communities, and a \$150,000 for a non-facility branch in Elyria. The new French Creek YMCA at Avon will be 66,527 square feet, anchored with a competitive swimming pool.

► Association-wide, 3,601 adults participated in fitness programs, including swimming, exercise classes, open gym, personal training and weight training during 2007.

► The YMCA of Greater Cleveland served 59,162 individuals in a variety of programs and services during 2007.

► Aquatics programs served 6,732 individuals during 2007.

► Funding for the Euclid Collaborative increased by \$20,000 from 2006.

► The Euclid Collaborative hosted a community-wide "Give-Away Day" in conjunction with the Euclid Police Department. Clothing, household items, furniture, and other small items went to those in need in the city of Euclid and surrounding suburbs.

► Clevelanders in Motion has become an official branch within the YMCA of Greater Cleveland Association, moving into newly refurbished office space on the second floor of the Downtown YMCA thanks to a generous grant from the St. Luke's Foundation to cover office upgrades and furnishings. Over the past year and under contract with the Cleveland Department of Public Health's Steps to a Healthier Cleveland program, the Clevelanders in Motion program has continued to develop and distribute postcard-style neighborhood walking maps with points of interest on the back. Thusfar, maps have been developed for Downtown Cleveland and the following neighborhoods: Bellaire-Puritas, Central, Clark, Metro, Detroit-Shoreway, Fairfax, Forest Hills, Hough, Kinsman, Ohio City, St. Clair-Superior, Slavic Village, Stockyards and Tremont. Additional maps are under development for Downtown, Buckeye, Cudell and Lee-Harvard, as well as for the communities of East Cleveland, North Randall, and Warrensville Heights, which will be used by YMCA staff to lead weekly walking clubs in partnership with local partner organizations.



► The YMCA Youth Marathon Program, launched modestly in 2006 and designed to enable 6-12 grade student runners to engage in pre-race conditioning activities equivalent to running 25 miles, continued with 150 students representing 13 schools, including 28 sixth graders from Buckeye-Woodland, who trained for and ran the entire Rite-Aid Cleveland Marathon. For participating in the Marathon program, students earned a pair of running shoes, but also earned the privilege of running the final 1.2 miles of the Rite-Aid Cleveland marathon. A total of 550 student runners were recruited, representing 28 schools.

► In Lorain County, the YMCA of Greater Cleveland offered a wide array of classes including youth sports, basketball, soccer and t-ball during 2007.

► The West Park-Fairview Family YMCA continued a collaboration with the SOAR program offering various aerobic dance classes to adults with physical and/or mental challenges.

► The 2007 Strong Kids Campaign reached 119 percent of goal, raising \$540,522 to underwrite membership and program scholarships for youth and families. Our thanks to the 106 volunteer campaigners who contributed to the campaign's success under the leadership of co-chairs Mike Fruchey, Director at Archstone Consulting and Reggie Stover, Vice President, Human Resources for Pepsi Americas East Group.

► 185 YMCA staff members contributed \$7,924 to the United Way of Greater Cleveland's Annual Campaign.

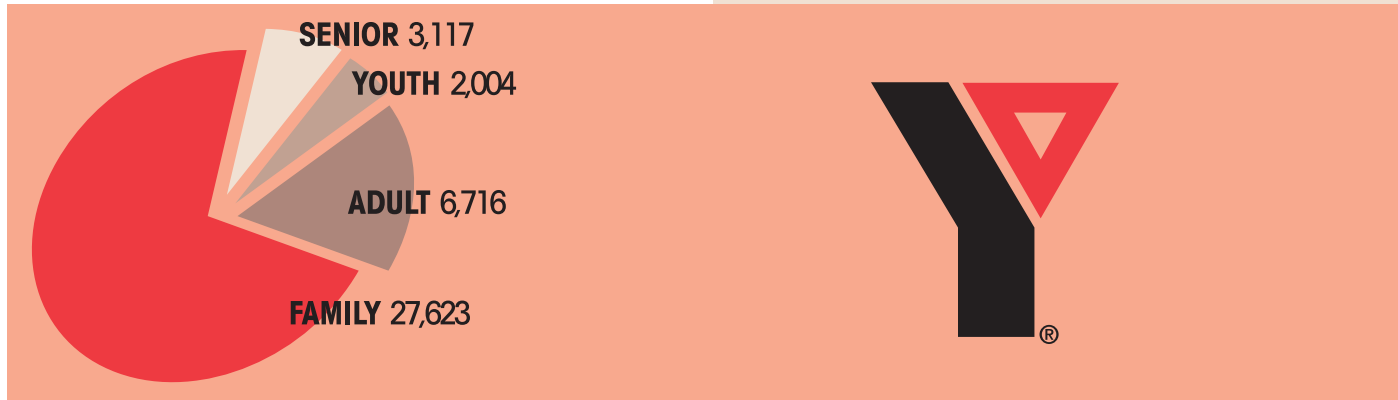
